

# YOUR YEAR ROUND GUIDE TO COTSWOLDS GARDENS

We have put together this great little guide to the gardens of the Cotswolds so that you can plan your visit at any time of the year.



Cotswold gardens are wonderful to visit all year round – from the onset of spring to the height of summer, mellow autumn months or the depths of winter – an often overlooked time for garden visits.

What could be better than enjoying a bracing walk, soaking up inspirational garden design, before heading back to your hotel for a traditional afternoon tea, or something stronger, in front of a roaring fire?

This guide, which has a handy map inside, will take you through the seasons of our captivating Cotswold gardens so you can create your very own garden route. It's a great opportunity to slow down, escape the madness of modern life and enjoy a wonderful weekend admiring everything our gardens have to offer.







After the depths of winter, the Cotswold year begins with the first flush of snowdrops – make sure you take a look at our spring guide to see the best snowdrop locations. As the days begin to warm and daffodils make a welcome appearance, gardens all over the Cotswolds start bursting into life.

Historic woodland such as **Woodchester**Park and the Gloucestershire Wildlife

Nature Reserve are carpeted with
bluebells while hedgerows and our
arboreta at Batsford and Westonbirt are
awash with blossom.

In late spring and summer, herbaceous borders take over as the stars of the show with Newark Park, Hidcote, Snowshill Manor, Sezincote and Bourton House Garden guaranteed to delight. Blenheim Palace, Kiftsgate Court and Sudeley Castle's Queens' Garden, named after the four English Queens that walked within, become beautifully fragrant with roses.

As summer turns to autumn, and the trees take on a golden hue, dramatic colours can be seen throughout the arboreta and ancient beech woodlands of the Cotswolds.

And in Cheltenham, beautiful Regency buildings are complemented by formal gardens, parks and tree-lined avenues. Admire the flowers of Imperial Gardens, or the more spacious landscapes and trees of Montpellier Gardens, while Pittville Park, home to Cheltenham's iconic pump room, is laid out with trees and ornamental lakes for the pleasure of visitors in the 19th century.



# CELEBRATE SPRING

Shake off the winter blues and celebrate the first signs of spring with a stroll around some of our gardens famed for their fantastic displays of snowdrops. Known as 'heralds of spring', they start flowering as early as January and you'll be spoilt for choice of Cotswold gardens to get your snowdrop fix.

Cerney House Gardens, Newark Park, Rodmarton Manor and Painswick Rococo Garden have incredible snowdrop displays, with Colesbourne Park boasting more than 250 different varieties and the chance to buy some of them yourself.

Across the Cotswolds you'll be bowled over by the gorgeous spring flower displays – whether it's native bluebell woods, magnificent magnolias or the spectacular blossom lining the hedgerows and taking centre stage in our two Cotswold arboreta at Batsford and Westonbirt.





## SUMMER SPECTACULAR

There's nowhere like the Cotswolds for blowsy summer gardens and inspirational design ideas. Home to some of the most spectacular world-class gardens you could ever hope to visit, you'll also find smaller and less well-known examples of quintessential English gardens.

One of the best known is **Hidcote Manor Gardens** – an Arts and Crafts inspired garden designed by American Major Lawrence Johnston, whose creation of garden rooms has left its design mark all over the Cotswolds.

For glorious herbaceous borders alive with buzzing insects and stunning colours, choose **Bourton House Garden**, and if you can't resist the sight and smell of English roses, head for **Blenheim Palace** whose centrepiece rose garden was originally created by the 5th Duke of Marlborough, or **Kiftsgate Court Garden** – home to the

flamboyant Kiftsgate rose. Or walk in the footsteps of kings and queens of old, and meander through the rose garden at Sudeley Castle.


And good enough to rival the lavender fields of Provence, don't miss Snowshill Lavender in the height of summer when you can see 70 miles and 35 different varieties of lavender at their blowsy best.



# BLAZING AUTUMN

Enjoy the season of mist and mellow fruitfulness in the Cotswolds as hedgerows take on warm, autumnal tones and you'll discover colour-a-plenty at our two arboreta - beautiful **Batsford** and wonderful **Westonbirt Arboretum!** From mid to late October you'll witness one of the best natural fireworks displays in the country!

Don't forget some of our gardens also offer magnificent autumn colour. **Bourton House Garden** has a wonderful display of exotic hot planting and the grasses at the **Cotswold Wildlife Park** look their absolute best.





### WINTER WONDERS

If you thought winter was a dull time to visit Cotswold gardens then think again! It's the perfect time to appreciate some of the inspirational garden design which means our gardens are full of colour and interest throughout the winter months.

'Capability' Brown's gorgeous landscapes at **Blenheim Palace** World Heritage Site and **Broadway Tower** offer spectacular views of the surrounding countryside, as well as beautiful parkland, fountains and formal gardens.

**Rousham House and Gardens** are a budding designers dream, revealing how evergreen planting and a limited colour palette bring interest all year round. A favourite of TV gardener Monty Don it's one of a few 18th century gardens to have escaped major alteration.

For a festive twist make sure not to miss the wonderful illuminated experiences held at **Blenheim Palace**, **Westonbirt Arboretum** and **Sudeley Castle** in the run up to Christmas each year.


## QUIRKY COTSWOLDS

There's no shortage of unusual or quirky gardens and hidden Cotswold gems.

More than thirty years in the making, the Royal Gardens at Highgrove are designed by HRH Prince Charles and are one of the most creatively inspiring and innovative gardens in the country. The summer display of delphiniums and national collection of hostas are must-sees!

Organic Brockworth Court is a tapestry-style garden wrapped around a stunning manor house dating back to medieval times, while Sezincote's romantic landscape of temples, grottoes, waterfalls and canals, as well as a 200 year old Mogul Indian palace takes some beating for a unique place to visit.

And Herbs for Healing, created by Davina Wynne-Jones – daughter of famous garden designer and plants-woman Rosemary Verey – was planted using only plants with healing properties.



#### PLACES TO STAY WITH GORGEOUS GARDENS

If you are planning a weekend break – or a longer stay - you'll be spoilt for choice for places to stay where the gardens are as sumptuous as the bedrooms!

Barnsley House - the former home of garden designer, lecturer and prolific garden writer, Rosemary Verey who began redesigning the gardens in the 1950s to critical acclaim. The stunning English gardens now attract global interest.





Lords of the Manor – eight acres of perfectly manicured gardens designed to blend beautifully into the Cotswold landscape which surrounds it. Designed to be enjoyed, they include a sweeping lawn to the lake, walled garden, perennial planting and meadow.

Whatley Manor – Inspired by the original 1920s plan, the twelve acre gardens featuring twenty six distinct rooms combine classic English garden style with more contemporary touches like specially commissioned sculpture.





Thyme – beautiful accommodation on a 150 acre working farm with newly planted herb and cutting gardens and polytunnels to extend the growing season. Everything grown helps stock the restaurants, cookery school and spa.

Cowley Manor – a haven of tranquillity, these grade II listed gardens include an eclectic tree collection and flower blooms all year round. It's the perfect place to reconnect with nature.




#### Blenheim Palace






#### Sezincote
